### NEW ZEALAND YOUTH CHOIR VOICES NEW ZEALAND CHAMBER CHOIR HOLY TRINITY CATHEDRAL, PARNELL

### Wednesday 20 March, 7pm

Benjamin Britten was born in Lowestoft in 1913. His mother, a keen amateur singer, was thrilled that her youngest was born on 22 November: the feast day of St Cecilia, the patron saint of music. She hoped he would – after Bach. Beethoven and Brahms – become the 'Fourth B'.

He did indeed become a global musical figure. In just 63 busy years Britten wrote some of the most appealing classical music of the twentieth century, was hailed as one of the all-time great opera composers, and – with his partner, the singer Peter Pears – performed around the world.

Britten was a progressive cultural figure too, ahead of his time on issues including pacifism, homosexuality and the role of artists in their communities.



Little Britten featuring the New Zealand Youth Choir, Voices New Zealand Chamber Choir and organist James Tibbles celebrates Benjamin Britten's centenary. Britten, one of the most widely performed of 20th century British composers was renowned particularly for his operas, vocal and choral music. The New Zealand Youth Choir will perform 'Rejoice in the Lamb', one of Britten's most popular and performed works. written for the 50th anniversary of St. Matthew's church. Northampton in 1943. Britten called his work a "Festival Cantata" and it is structured with choral and solo movements accompanied by organ.

The 'Five Flower Songs' were written in 1950 for Britten's friends Dorothy and Leonard Elmhirst who were keen botanists hence the movement titles:

1, To Daffodils; 2. The Succession of the Four Sweet Months; 3. Marsh Flowers; 4. The Evening Primrose; 5. Ballad of Green Broom.

'Sacred and Profane' Op. 91 is a setting of 'Eight Medieval Lyrics' written in 1974-5. The movements are 1. St Godric's Hymn; 2. I mon waxe wod; 3. Lenten is come; 4. The long night; 5. Yif ic of luve can; 6. Carol, 7. Ye that pasen by; 8. A Death

Written in 1940 while Britten was in America during the war, the organ solo 'Voluntary on Tallis' Lamentation' was left behind when he returned to England. It only came to light when Elizabeth Mayer, Britten's host during his stay, willed it amongst other papers to the Britten Estate. This will be the NZ premiere of this Voluntary. 'Fugue on a theme of Vittoria', probably Britten's best known organ work is founded on a theme used by Vittoria in his four-voice motet Ecce Sacerdos Magnus from 1585.

NZ Youth Choir and Voices New Zealand join forces to sing 'Hymn to the Virgin', one of Britten's earliest works written in 1930. His earliest surviving piece of church music was written while he was still at school studying music with Frank Bridge. The concluding 'Festival Te Deum', a glorious work with virtuoso organ accompaniment was composed in 1944 for the choir of St Mark's Church, Swindon.



### ARTISTIC DIRECTOR, VOICES NEW ZEALAND CHAMBER CHOIR—KAREN GRYLLS

Karen Grylls founded Voices New Zealand Chamber Choir in 1998 and the choir has achieved acclaim both nationally and internationally. She is Associate Professor in Conducting and Head of Choral Studies at the University of Auckland and in addition to being Music Director of Voices, retains her role as Artistic Director of the Choirs Aotearoa NZ Trust, the managing body for the NZ Youth Choir and Voices.

Karen Grylls is much in demand as a choral clinician and invitations to adjudicate have taken her all around the world. She also has many CD recordings to her credit. In 1996 the university honoured her with a

Distinguished Teaching Award in Music and in 1999 she received an ONZM for her services to choral music.

Voices New Zealand Chamber Choir was formed in 1998 with Dr Karen Grylls as its Music Director. As a nationally selected choir of the highest calibre, Voices, which includes some former members of the New Zealand Youth Choir, provides a chamber choir, flexible in size, and capable of performing a wide repertoire.

### MUSICAL DIRECTOR, NEW ZEALAND YOUTH CHOIR—DAVID SQUIRE

Music Director of the New Zealand Youth Choir, David is one of country's most prominent choral clinicians. A founding member of the newly-formed New Zealand Association of Choral Directors, he is also a national conducting mentor for this organisation.

He completed his Bachelor of Music degree at the University of Auckland, with an emphasis on conducting and composition. He studied singing with Isabel Cunningham, Glenese Blake and Beatrice Webster, and conducting with Karen Grylls and Juan Matteucci.

In March 2011 David Squire was awarded a New

Zealander of the Year Local Heroes Medal for services to music education. The New Zealand Youth Choir has achieved considerable success since its forma-

tion in 1979. Performances around New Zealand and eight international tours have firmly established the choir's reputation for consistency energy and excellence.

### **BRITTEN 100**

The centenary of Benjamin Britten will be the most widely celebrated anniversary of a British composer ever seen. His 100th birthday is on 22 November 2013, but the official celebrations started in September 2012 and will go on until August 2014, to include the concert seasons either side of the centenary year.

Britten 100 - covering many hundreds of events and activities around the world - is being coordinated from The Red House in Aldeburgh by the Britten-Pears Foundation.
